Young filmmakers release new film to mark Peterloo 2019 Peterloo 2019 • HOME BFI Film Academy 2018

A collection of the region's young up and coming filmmakers have released a new film exploring some of the issues and ideas connected to the legacy of the **Peterloo Massacre** 200 years on, as part of the **HOME BFI Academy 2018**. The film academy has been running for seven years and on this occasion has partnered with **Peterloo 2019**, a project led by **Manchester Histories** to explore the contemporary perspective of this watershed moment in the story of Manchester.

A group of 18 young people aged 16-19 were given chance to take part in an intensive film-training course. Their creative challenge was to consider how the themes of the Peterloo Massacre (16 August 1819) relate to their lives; looking at comparative issues of freedom of speech, democracy and protest 200 years on. The Peterloo Massacre began as a peaceful demonstration in Manchester for rights and representation with thousands gathering to express their views; the filmmakers used this as a counterpoint to look closely at what freedom of expression means to them.

The results of their exploration is a short film entitled **FREESTYLE**, some of which has been shot on the streets of Manchester. The narrative follows the journey of a young dancer, with the students developing the script and storylines.

Jason Wood, Artistic Director of Film at HOME and Professor of Film at Manchester Metropolitan University, said of FREESTYLE, "This film is genuinely incredible. Shot with realism but with a sprinkling of hope. Congratulations to all. What an amazing thing to be part of."

Reflecting on the course one of the **young filmmakers** said, "I am inspired to further involve myself in the subject of film, and the history of Manchester is something I

want to take with me when making films." Another remarked on the message of the film "It inspired me to talk about and explore a cause. If our film helps others see the messages and themes we conveyed then we couldn't be more happier or inspired to do more."

The partnership between **HOME** and **Manchester Histories** was supported by the **Heritage Lottery Fund** to mark the 200th anniversary of the **Peterloo Massacre**.

Karen Shannon, Chief Executive of Manchester Histories which is leading Peterloo 2019, says, "The issues and themes arising from the legacy of Peterloo are as relevant today as they were 200 years ago and the HOME BFI Film Academy gave young people the opportunity to creatively examine what they mean to them and their lives.

"We're immensely proud of the film they've created which has seen them take on a host of filmmaking techniques during the process including research, camera, sound, directing and editing, mixing and grading. It's a very original and personal take on the core principles of freedom of expression and democracy."

The film has premiered at HOME and is now available to view on the Manchester Histories website at: <u>www.manchesterhistories.co.uk/projects/peterloo2019</u>. It will also be submitted to international film festivals taking place throughout 2019.

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Notes to editors

The Peterloo Massacre was a watershed moment that would mark Manchester as a radical city like no other and become a defining moment for Britain's democracy. On Monday 16 August 1819, a 60,000-strong crowd walked to the meeting point at St Peter's Field in Central Manchester from as far afield as Wigan, Rochdale, Saddleworth and Altrincham to call for parliamentary representation. Shortly after the meeting began and whilst the orator Henry Hunt was making his address, local government forces charged into the crowd on horseback and with swords drawn, injuring 700 and killing 18 men, women and children.
