
LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Estimated number of displaced Syrians by location in 2017*



About: STAR is a network of student groups, founded in 1994, which today has over 27,000 members at 46 different universities and colleges in the UK. Their members volunteer to support refugees, campaign for better treatment of people who cross borders, and educate others about the hardships many refugees and asylum seekers face.

Activities: STAR supporters run English Conversation Clubs, where students and refugees talk- this helps people learn English, and make new friends in the UK. STAR campaigns for students who have come other countries to have the same rights to access education as people born in the UK. STAR runs homework clubs, where university students can help share their skills and knowledge with refugees and asylum seekers who are at school.





- Sri Lanka: Independence in 1948

- Tamils faced discrimination from the larger group of Sinhalese.
- Many Tamils sought independence and a separate state.
- Civil War 1983-2009

VIRAJ MENDIS DEFENCE CAMPAIGN

Viraj Mendis arrives in Britain in 1973, aged 17.

He becomes politically active, joining the Revolutionary Communist Group. He supports the Tamils who are fighting for their own state.

1984 - Conservative government orders him to leave.

Viraj and his lawyers argue it would be unsafe if he returned because of his views.


December 1986 - Viraj seeks sanctuary in the Church of the Ascension, in Hulme, Manchester.

A large campaign is organised to support Viraj, with many people from different religious and political groups involved.

People stay in the church with him, and organise weekly protests.

January 1989 - 100 police raid the church. Viraj is deported.
